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



Tuition fees and study costs

Commonwealth-Supported Places

Most undergraduate degrees are subsidised by the Government. These are called Commonwealth-Supported Places. You pay a part of the tuition and the Government pays the rest. You can defer the payment of your part of the fees through the HECS-HELP scheme. This is a loan that you repay only when your income reaches the repayment threshold. You then pay it back a little at a time through the tax system.

Student Services and Amenities Fee

Also known as SSAF, the Student Services and Amenities Fee is charged for each study period in which you are enrolled and is used to provide important services and amenities to students both on and off campus. Eligible students have the option of deferring this fee through the SA-HELP loan scheme.

Other study costs


Your costs could also include computer equipment and software, stationery, field trips, uniforms or other course-specific expenses such as art materials, musical equipment or travel for practicums, internships or industry experience.

Books and supplies

Most courses will require you to buy textbooks. The cost of textbooks varies greatly from unit to unit. Students can consult booktopia.com.au to find textbooks for a given unit. Second-hand textbooks are sometimes available.

Pathways to university

Whether you're still at school, have just finished Year 12, never finished school or left some time ago, there are many pathways into university.



SCU College

If you don't meet the Bachelor degree entry requirements, SCU College offers a range of alternative pathways to university study. SCU College classes are small and extra support is available for all students.

Preparing for Success Program

The Preparing for Success Program (PSP) can be completed full-time over 12 weeks or part-time in one year, either on campus or online. PSP is fee-free and equips you with the study skills needed for success at university. Students who complete the program can proceed directly to a Southern Cross University degree with the confidence that they are well-prepared.

Transition to Uni

Transition to Uni is a fee-free, intensive preparatory course designed for current ATAR-eligible Year 12 students or school leavers who have completed Year 12 with an ATAR (or equivalent). The course develops the key academic literacies and foundational scientific and quantitative concepts you will need at university. Passing the Transition to Uni program will guarantee you entry into all Southern Cross University undergraduate degrees, excluding Midwifery.

SCU College Diplomas

The College also offers a range of Diplomas, which are guaranteed pathways to a Bachelor degree. Whether it is arts, education, information technology, engineering, health or science, SCU College has a pathway Diploma to prepare you for your Bachelor studies. Diplomas provide up to one year of credit towards a Bachelor degree. A Diploma can also be a one-year standalone qualification. Diploma classes are small, and focus on improving your academic skills and discipline knowledge. Diploma students also have access to the College Connect academic support workshops.

Rylee decided to study Biomedical Science to fulfil her passion for understanding details, such as microbial interactions, biochemical pathways, and the role of various blood cells in health and disease.

"I'm hoping to study bacteriophages during my Honours research year and how we could possibly use bacteriophages to re-sensitise bacteria to antibiotics they were previously resistant to."

The Southern Cross Model


Most courses in 2022 will be delivered in the Southern Cross Model. This is an academic model designed to give you more control over the way you study and to make your studies flexible and dynamic.

The Model divides the academic year into six terms of eight weeks each. You have the option to complete one or two units in each term, so you are only studying one or at the most two subjects at a time.

A full-time study load is a minimum of six units and a maximum of 12 units per year. You can take a term off when you need to, or do more study when you have the time.

You determine the speed and pace of your studies, with greater flexibility in balancing life and work commitments. Taking one or two units at a time means your learning is focused and assessments are more evenly spaced out during the year, giving you a greater chance of success in your studies.

Design your degree

Want to study arts, but also passionate about helping to solve global environmental challenges? Or perhaps you're interested in business but also psychology? Or science but also digital media? Depending on which course you are enrolled in, you may be able to combine more of your interests by choosing a shared major from a wide range of disciplines across the University. A shared major is the equivalent of eight units, or a third of a three-year Bachelor degree.

You can combine one of these 4 degrees with any shared major:

Bachelor of Arts Bachelor of Business and Enterprise

Bachelor of Psychological Science Bachelor of Science

Shared majors

Art and Design

Students will develop drawing skills, fabrication skills and an understanding of contemporary art and its theory. They will learn the fundamentals of art making and critique through individual assessment and group learning.

Aviation Management

Students will be exposed to the strategic and operational facets of the global aviation industry, including six core aviation units and a further two elective units. This major is ideal for students who are looking to work in aviation including pilots, cabin crew, logistics, transport, infrastructure, retail and customer service.

Biomedical Science

This major provides students with a solid foundation in the basic sciences that underpin the structure and function of the human body in relation to health and disease, with options to explore genetics, infection and immunity, population health, medical laboratory sciences and more.

Business and Data Analytics

This major will develop the ability to use data analysis for insights into authentic problems. Students use a variety of tools to clean and transform data, before employing techniques to visualise and communicate information.

Contemporary Music

Focusing on music making in the 21st century, this major will develop a student's practical, theoretical, creative, collaborative and contextual skills through a program of ensemble performance, musicianship, musicology and industry studies.

Creative Writing

This major provides an introduction to creative writing genres and techniques, developing students' ability to engage with the world creatively, increasing their creative writing skills and understanding of literature.

Cultural Studies

This major introduces students to critical approaches in the study of different cultural forms and practices and the political dynamics of contemporary culture. It includes units on identity, gender and sexuality, ecocultural studies and Australian perspectives.

Digital Media

This major introduces students to a core set of crossmedia production skills and software proficiencies, media history and theory, and knowledge of various narrative and story structures. Students gain experience in the production and critical study of contemporary digital media.

Entrepreneurship and Innovation

This major allows students to develop a nuanced understanding of the critical components of entrepreneurship and what factors will ensure success in a highly competitive business environment. Successful development of innovative ideas is explored in depth.

Environmental Solutions

This major is for students who wish to gain insight into how nature works, and how communities can support nature to regenerate in the face of environmental change. Students learn to develop creative solutions to the world's complex environmental challenges from ecology and marine pollution to wildlife conservation and regenerative farming.





History

Studying the past and how we have interpreted history is essential to understanding contemporary issues. As well as units on Australian and colonial histories, this major includes units on the US, Asia and other world history, writing and research.

Indigenous Knowledge

This major includes units that increase the knowledge and understanding of Indigenous peoples, their cultures and associated rights. It examines historical and contemporary issues affecting Indigenous Australian Peoples.

Law and Justice

Students gain legal perspectives that will complement their degree and a foundational understanding of law and basic legal principles that will be useful in any employment situation.

Politics and International Relations

With an emphasis on social justice and positive change, this major will develop students' ability to interpret, analyse and offer creative solutions to issues in contemporary society, encouraging them to become dynamic citizens in the public sphere.

Psychology

This major is ideal for students who are interested in the scientific study of how humans think, feel and behave. Please note this major is not accredited by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council and does not provide entry into the Bachelor of Psychological Science with Honours.

Regenerative Agriculture

This major examines human ecology, agroecology, regenerative agronomy and soil management as well as the planning of rural landscapes. It draws on the University's specialist expertise across these areas, developing knowledge in a whole-of-system approach to food production and farm management.

Sustainability

This major examines the social, cultural, economic and environmental aspects of sustainability. It equips students with concepts and tools enabling multidisciplinary sustainable solutions to be found within a broad range of industry applications.

Tourism Management

This major develops a contemporary understanding of the tourism industry, tourist experience, destination management and the conceptual and applied aspects of responsible and sustainable tourism management.



A shared major is the equivalent of eight units or one year of fulltime study in a Bachelor degree.

The Bachelor of Arts focuses on human cultures, values and beliefs that will broaden your mind with challenging ideas. The course fosters transferable skills that are highly valued across all sectors – such as communication, analysis, critical thinking and problem solving.

At Southern Cross you'll have the opportunity to apply those skills to the real world through community engagement as you delve deeper into contemporary social and environmental justice issues. The Bachelor of Arts is a very flexible degree – you can tailor your studies through the choice of a major in Creative Writing, Cultural Studies, Digital Media, History or Political and International Relations or choose a shared major from a wide range of disciplines across the University.

Majors

Creative Writing

A rich blend of study across fiction and nonfiction, experimental writing, journalism, life writing, poetry, writing for stage and screen, and writing for young adults, taught by published writers from the Northern Rivers arts community and beyond.

Cultural Studies

Cultural Studies introduces you to critical approaches in the study of different cultural forms and practices, everyday life and the political dynamics of contemporary culture.

Digital Media

This major introduces key digital media production skills and theories. It provides a background in media history and theory, as well as practical experience in design, journalism, narrative forms and audio-visual media production.

Professional placement

You can undertake placements and learning opportunities in the community through a number of units and assessments.

Career opportunities

The Bachelor of Arts opens up a range of career opportunities in communication industries, community relations, journalism, cultural policy, management and administration, publishing, public service, multimedia design, creative and cultural industries, politics, social justice and human rights, and secondary school teaching (with further study).

History

Historical study fosters critical approaches to evidence and argument and the ability to interpret and communicate complex ideas, as well as insight into how personal and cultural values are shaped over time.

The Bachelor of Business and Enterprise has a focus on developing innovation and impact in a complex and changing business world, with inspired and multidisciplinary learning experiences. You'll become equipped with the practical skills, tools and knowledge that are vital for the sustainability of society, business and industry.

You'll build a portfolio of professional experiences through a range of real-world interactions with employers, industry and the community. Specialise in accounting or financial services, or focus your studies through a major in aviation management, business and data analytics, entrepreneurship and innovation, sustainability or tourism management.

Specialisations

Accounting

Put yourself on an accredited pathway to become a CPA or Chartered Accountant. Gain the skills and knowledge needed to navigate the multifaceted world of helping people and organisations make accounting decisions.

Majors

Aviation Management

Ideal for students who are looking to work in aviation including pilots, cabin crew, logistics, transport, infrastructure, retail and customer service. Includes the opportunity to obtain a Commercial Pilots Licence.

Business and Data Analytics

This major develops your expertise in contemporary data analytics tools and technologies, data analytics solutions, and data analytics insights in order to support decision-making and inform long-term strategies.



Bachelor of Education

ATAR 60

Duration 4 years full-time/8 years part-time

Starts February, June

Location Gold Coast, Lismore, Coffs Harbour, online

The Bachelor of Education is a gateway degree to work as registered teacher in Australia. First year is a foundation year with a solid grounding in literacy, numeracy and pedagogy as well as issues in contemporary education.

You will choose a specialisation depending on your teaching preference. This will determine your career outcome, as you'll either be qualified as a primary or secondary teacher or if you choose a combined specialisation, you'll be able to teach across a wider range of age groups. In the secondary programs you will choose from a variety of teaching subjects depending on your teaching preference.

Specialisations

You can choose a single or combined specialisation:

Early Childhood/Primary

For teaching in both early childhood settings and primary schools.

Primary

For teaching in primary schools from kindergarten to Year 6. Includes an approved compulsory English Primary Specialisation with opportunities for an approved Specialisation in Mathematics or Science.

Primary/Secondary

For teaching in both primary schools and in secondary schools in one subject. Includes a compulsory English Primary Specialisation.

Secondary

In this teaching area, you choose two teaching subjects from the full range of secondary subjects.

Technology

In this specialisation you choose from either Design and Technology or Food and Fibre and a second teaching area from a range of subjects.

Professional placement

You'll complete a substantial program of in-school professional teaching experiences as part of your degree, enabling you to apply your theoretical knowledge in real-world educational settings.

Career opportunities

Graduates are qualified to work as teachers across Australia. Depending on the specialisation chosen, graduates may work in early childhood settings, primary or secondary schools.

Professional recognition

This course is pending accreditation from the NSW Education Standards Authority and nationally through the Australian Institute for Teaching and School Leadership. The Early Childhood/Primary specialisation is also pending accreditation from the Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority.

Bachelor of Early Childhood Education

ATAR 60

Duration 3 years full-time/6 years part-time

Starts February, June

Location Gold Coast, Lismore, Coffs Harbour, online

There is strong demand for qualified early childhood educators. This degree gives you a three-year qualification to work in early childhood settings with children from six-weeks-old to six-years-old.

Core units cover early childhood principles and practices, literacy, language and pedagogical approaches for early childhood education.

Students will investigate contemporary issues in early childhood education, leadership and management; and health and wellbeing in the early childhood environment.

Professional placement

You'll complete a substantial program of professional teaching experiences as part of your degree in a range of early childhood environments, enabling you to apply your theoretical knowledge in real-world educational settings.

Career opportunities

Graduates will be three-year-trained Early Childhood educators.

Professional recognition

This course is pending accreditation from the Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority.

Check with your state-based accreditation authorities regarding status as an early childhood teacher.



Engineering

The Bachelor of Engineering Systems (Honours) is designed to meet the requirements for accreditation at the level of Professional Engineer by Engineers Australia. Foundational core units build knowledge of the basic sciences, and the processes and philosophy that underpin the engineering profession.

You'll then choose a specialisation to build discipline knowledge and technical skills with a strong emphasis on project-based learning. This will determine your career outcomes as you develop expertise in an area of engineering practice - either civil, coastal systems or mechanical engineering.

The final year of the course contains a mixture of advanced core units and advanced disciplinespecific units that are designed to build skills in independent investigation, critical thinking, creative problem solving, and ethical and professional behaviour.

The course is structured around 16 key competencies identified by Engineers Australia as being essential to the graduating engineer. These competencies are broadly grouped into: knowledge and skills, application, personal and professional skills.

Specialisations

Civil Engineering

Students develop skills and knowledge across the breadth of disciplines encompassed by civil engineering, including construction, project management, hydraulic engineering, water and wastewater engineering, geotechnical engineering, traffic and transport engineering, and environmental engineering.

Graduates from the Civil Engineering specialisation will be able to work in a range of settings, including traffic and transport, humanitarian organisations, engineering design, government authorities, water supply and management agencies, construction companies, natural resource management organisations, consulting engineering companies, mining companies, irrigation authorities.

Students who have graduated from the Associate Degree of Civil Construction (Engineering and Management) may also elect to major in Construction Engineering as part of this specialisation.

Coastal Systems Engineering

Students develop skills and knowledge in core areas that include coastal engineering and management, floodplain engineering and management, project management, hydraulic engineering, water and wastewater engineering, engineering geochemistry and hydrology.

Professional placement

This course includes a compulsory 60-day industry experience unit in a relevant engineering role.

Professional recognition

This course is accredited by Engineers Australia at different levels according to the specialisation chosen. Please see the website for details. Courses accredited

Graduates from the Coastal Systems Engineering specialisation will be able to work in water resource and/or environmental engineering roles in a range of settings involving systems and infrastructure in the coastal zone, including municipal and government authorities, water supply and management agencies, construction companies, natural resource management organisations, consulting engineering companies, airport authorities, mining companies, irrigation authorities, research organisations, and education organisations.

Mechanical Engineering

Students develop skills and knowledge in three main areas that cover all aspects of mechanical engineering, which are design and production systems, thermo-fluid mechanics and energy systems, and mechatronics and control Systems.

Graduates from the Mechanical Engineering specialisation have broad employment prospects. They can work in diverse industries including heavy machinery, power generation, mining, manufacturing, production planning, automotive, aerospace, medical, robotics, environment, building industries and consumer product design.

by Engineers Australia at this level are recognised in many different countries worldwide through the Washington Accord.

Entry pathways

Graduates of the Diploma of Science are guaranteed entry into this course and receive up to 8 units of credit for their previous study.

Associate Degree of Civil Construction (Engineering and Management)

Apply directly to the University

Duration 32 months part-time

Starts February, June, October

Location Online

There is strong demand for site supervisors and project managers in the civil construction industry. This course develops the fundamental technical and practical skills needed for these roles and is suited to school leavers or those with a trade qualification who are looking to enter the industry or progress their careers to a supervisory or management level.

It has a focus on developing both practical and technical engineering skills, particularly around familiarity with technology, and includes a strong work-integrated learning component.

It also provides a pathway to further study in civil engineering at a Bachelor degree level. Graduates of the Associate Degree of Civil Construction (Engineering and Management) who continue to the Bachelor of Engineering Systems (Honours) will have the opportunity to major in Construction Engineering as part of the Civil Engineering specialisation to develop the necessary skills and expertise for work as a professional engineer in the civil construction industry.

Professional placement

All students will need to undertake at least three sevenweek work placements. Ideally, students will complete the entire course while working in industry, although this is not mandatory.

Career opportunities

This course prepares graduates to work at the paraprofessional level as site superintendents, site supervisors, site engineers, and project managers at the level of engineering associate in the civil construction industry. It is also a pathway to further study.

Professional recognition

Recognised by Engineers Australia at the level of Engineering Associate.

Diploma of Civil Construction (Engineering and Management)

Apply directly to the University

Duration 2 years part-time

Starts February, June, October

Location Online

This course is designed for school leavers or those with a trade qualification who are looking to upskill and move into supervisory roles.

The course has a focus on developing technical and practical skills sought after by industry. It also provides a pathway to further study in civil engineering at a Bachelor or Associate Degree level.

Professional placement

All students will need to undertake at least one sevenweek work placement. Ideally, you will complete the entire course while working in industry, although this is not mandatory.

Career opportunities

This course prepares graduates for further study or to work at the paraprofessional level as project managers and site supervisors in the civil construction industry.

The Bachelor of Nursing offers an outstanding combination of practical training while building knowledge in health assessment, diagnosis, person-centred care and health plan development. This course responds to contemporary nursing practice and builds knowledge and skills in professional nursing, biological sciences and social sciences. You will learn in state-of-the-art facilities with interactive models and simulation laboratories.

Professional placement

Supervised clinical placements of approximately 860 hours provide you with nursing experience in public and private hospitals and health agencies. These may include acute and low care health facilities, community settings, mental health facilities, extended residential aged care, GP practices, Indigenous health, health promotion and education, intensive care, paediatrics, health clinics, accident and emergency, palliative care, primary health care settings and related nursing and health services. Elective opportunities include rural, remote, and international placements.

Career opportunities

Graduate opportunities for Registered Nurses exist in a range of public and private health sectors in clinical, education, management and research roles. These range from public health, justice and defence services through to non-for-profit organisations such as Médecins Sans Frontières (Doctors Without Borders).

Professional recognition

This course is approved by the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia and provides the necessary academic qualification for eligibility as a Registered Nurse in Australia. Please note: In order to register to practise, the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency standards for English language must be met.

Bachelor of Nursing (EN to RN pathway)

Apply directly to the University. Admission requires AHPRA registration as an Enrolled Nurse and is open to graduates of an ANMAC-approved Diploma in Nursing.

Duration 2 years full-time/4 years part-time

Starts February or June (June start Gold Coast only)

Location Gold Coast, Lismore, Coffs Harbour

The Bachelor of Nursing Enrolled Nurse to Registered Nurse Pathway is specifically designed for Enrolled Nurses to become Registered Nurses in just two years. Specialist conversion units develop your knowledge in professional nursing, biological sciences and social sciences, building on your professional experience and previous study. You'll have the opportunity to specialise in specific clinical areas of interest based on availability and supervisory facilities and learn in state-of-the-art facilities with interactive models and simulation laboratories.

Professional placement

Professional placements of approximately 680 hours are spread across several units within the course. These placements are located across a variety of healthcare settings. Included are several specifically designed professional experience placements for Enrolled Nurse Pathway students to facilitate progression towards the role of a Registered Nurse.

Professional recognition

This course is approved by the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia and provides the necessary academic qualification for eligibility as a Registered Nurse in Australia. Please note: In order to register to practise, the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency standards for English language must be met.

Bachelor of Midwifery

ATAR 80 [Interview process part of admission requirements]

Duration 3 years full-time/6 years part-time

Starts February, June, October Location Gold Coast, Coffs Harbour

The Bachelor of Midwifery is specifically designed to prepare you for entry to professional midwifery practice. You will develop the skills, knowledge and attitude to provide high quality care through safe and effective midwifery practice in accordance with the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Council Midwife standards for practice. Study areas include anatomy and physiology, midwifery theory and practice, primary healthcare, women's health, mental health and psychosocial sciences. Graduates will be equipped to work in multi-disciplinary teams and in partnership with women to contribute to healthier outcomes for mother and baby.

Professional placement

You undertake placements of approximately 1,000 hours and may attend antenatal and postnatal assessments/visits with women; provide direct care to women during labour; assist women during birth and support women and their babies with diverse needs across pregnancy, labour and birth, and the postnatal period.

Career opportunities

Registered midwives may practise midwifery in various capacities in public and private hospitals and community, maternity and neonatal health care settings in urban, rural and remote areas. They can practise as group practice midwives, clinical midwifery consultants, midwifery educators, midwifery unit managers, community midwives, researchers, and as independent midwives (with further training). They can work in any state of Australia and in New Zealand.

Professional recognition

The Bachelor of Midwifery is approved by the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia and provides the necessary qualification for graduates to be eligible to register and practise as a midwife in Australia. Further training is required to work as a privately practising midwife. Please note: In order to register to practise, the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency standards for English language must be met.

Entry pathways

A Registered Nurse (RN) only needs to complete the midwifery specific units, (60% of the total course, mostly part-time) in order to complete the Bachelor of Midwifery.



Bachelor of Biomedical Science

ATAR 70

Duration 3 years full-time/6 years part-time

Starts February, June, October

Location Gold Coast

The Bachelor of Biomedical Science provides you with a scientific understanding of the structure and function of the human body and the interrelationships between health and disease. Together with foundational sciences, you will explore the intricacies of human health and examine the pathological basis of disease processes by studying human pathophysiology, molecular genetics, immunology, microbiology and neuroscience.

This course has a strong mathematical component and is taught in laboratories equipped with cutting edge analytical equipment. It provides a solid base in biomedical science, from anatomy, immunology, neuroscience and microbiology to haematology and more.

Professional placement

Professional placements of 420 hours provide invaluable workplace experience in health and research facilities, such as pathology labs or research labs.

Career opportunities

Graduates find positions in biomedical, health, university and government research; hospital, veterinary and pathology laboratories and scientific sales; quality assurance, health departments and pharmaceutical and cosmetic industries. Graduates may qualify for postgraduate degrees such as pharmacy and physiotherapy or choose to pursue medicine or other careers.

Bachelor of Clinical Sciences (Osteopathic Studies)

ATAR 60

Duration 3 years full-time/6 years part-time

Starts February, June, October Location Gold Coast, Lismore

The Bachelor of Clinical Sciences (Osteopathic Studies) has a strong clinical focus and provides you with a comprehensive grounding in biomedical science and health. During the course, you will gain the knowledge and skills required to continue postgraduate study in osteopathic medicine, which is required for registration as an osteopath. Core units include the study of advanced levels of anatomy and physiology, particularly the structure and function of the muscular and nervous systems.

Professional placement

Professional placements provide you with approximately 320 hours of experience under the supervision of a qualified practitioner in the practice of safe and effective manual therapy and the application of a wide range of treatment and management plans. You have opportunities to work with a diverse range of patients in areas including injury and illness prevention and management, rehabilitation and health promotion. Clinical practice-based learning is also undertaken at the Southern Cross University Health Clinic, located at the Lismore and Gold Coast campuses.

Career opportunities

To become a registered osteopath, you need to successfully complete both the Bachelor of Clinical Sciences (Osteopathic Studies) and the Southern Cross University Master of Osteopathic Medicine. Total full-time duration of both courses is four years. Graduates of the Bachelor degree will receive four units of advanced standing into the Master of Osteopathic Studies.



Osteopathy

Osteopathy is a hands-on manual therapy that restores movement and function through a combination of massage, joint movement, stretches, gentle joint manipulation and exercise. In Australia, osteopaths are government registered allied health practitioners who complete university training in anatomy, physiology, pathology, general healthcare diagnosis, and osteopathic techniques. Osteopaths can provide all-round osteopathic care, as well as concentrating on specific areas of practice, such as exercise-based rehabilitation, pain management, paediatric and sports medicine.

Southern Cross University is one of just three universities in Australia to offer studies in osteopathy.

Bachelor of Exercise Science and Psychological Science

ATAR 65

Duration 4 years full-time/8 years part-time

Starts February, June, October

Location Coffs Harbour, Gold Coast, Lismore

The Bachelor of Exercise Science and Psychological Science provides understanding of the structure and function of the human body as it relates to movement, the interrelationships between health and disease, and the psychological basis of human behaviour.

Core studies for the exercise science component of the course include anatomy, biomechanics, physiology, sports conditioning and motor control. The psychological science component addresses analytical skills in solving human, organisational and community-wide problems, with core topics such as social psychology, cross-cultural psychology, abnormal psychology, biological psychology, and research methods. Two elective units are also available.

Professional placement

You complete a 140-hour exercise science professional placement in the third year of the course. Placements might be in health and sporting centres, clubs, schools and academies or sport and recreation centres.

Career opportunities

Graduates may also choose to pursue further training to gain registration as a psychologist or as an accredited exercise physiologist. Other opportunities exist in careers that have therapeutic connections to sport and exercise, such as physical activity promotion and rehabilitation.

Professional recognition

This course has Australian Psychology Accreditation Council accreditation for entrance into postgraduate training. The course also has qualifying accreditation with Exercise and Sport Science Australia (ESSA) with full accreditation pending the first graduate cycle.

Where science and human behaviour meet

The workplace can be either a battleground or a fertile ground for growth, depending on how you look at it. Batoul Hodroj spends a lot of time looking at workplaces in her ongoing training in organisational psychology.

She receives requests from companies interested in developing their workplace culture, for example increasing the number of women or people from diverse backgrounds in leadership positions or managing significant change.

"We apply science and our deep knowledge of human psychology to the problems an organisation faces. By collecting both quantitative and qualitative data like surveys and interviews, we can triangulate that with our analysis to come up with a solution that's based on evidence."

Batoul completed her Honours year at Southern Cross University in Coffs Harbour and is now completing a PhD. "I fell in love with Coffs Harbour and especially with research during my Honours year," she said. "The teaching staff and my supervisors lit a fire for me in that direction. It completely changed the trajectory of my life and what I had done to that point."

Bachelor of Psychological Science

ATAR 70

Duration 3 years full-time/6 years part-time

Starts February, June, October

Location Coffs Harbour, Gold Coast, online

The Bachelor of Psychological Science provides the first three years of full-time (or part-time equivalent) study and training required to prepare you for employment in a range of careers that benefit from knowledge of human psychological factors.

The degree focuses on providing a thorough understanding of the theoretical basis of psychological science, as well as the importance of research and evidence. The course covers analytical skills in solving human, organisational and community-wide problems; core topics such as social psychology, cross-cultural psychology, abnormal psychology, and biological psychology; competency in the design of research and interpretation of research findings; and a comprehensive understanding of statistical methods. You can study this course completely online, or with a mix of on-campus and online units.

Career opportunities

This is a pathway to the postgraduate study for eligible students. Completion of undergraduate and postgraduate study is the minimum educational qualification required to apply for conditional registration as a postgraduate intern in psychology in Australia. Psychologists are employed in health, social and disability services, youth services, corrective services, the armed services, research agencies such as the CSIRO, and in education. Private industry is also a large employer of psychologists who receive further specialised training for work in management, human resources and corporate consultancy services.

Professional recognition

This course has Australian Psychology Accreditation Council accreditation for entrance into postgraduate training.

Bachelor of Occupational Therapy

ATAR 60

Duration 4 years full-time/8 years part-time

Starts February, June, October Location Gold Coast, Coffs Harbour

Occupational therapists' work is diverse – they assist people of all ages and abilities to do what they need and want to do at home, work, school and in the community by transforming and adapting environments, activities or equipment where necessary to enhance participation in everyday tasks. In the Bachelor of Occupational Therapy you'll undertake studies in occupational therapy theory and practice, therapy assessments and interventions, occupational transitions across the lifespan, environmental modification, equipment prescription, task adaptation, facilitation, inclusion, participation and engagement, health promotion, social sciences, biological sciences; and have the option to major in Indigenous Health.

Majors

Indigenous Health (optional)

You will build theoretical and practical capability in areas including cultural protocols and Indigenous ways of knowing and being. This major includes embedded placement opportunities.

Professional placement

All students undertake professional placements of approximately 1,000 hours to build clinical and practical skills in settings that may include hospitals, community health, disability and mental health services, primary schools, work environments, aged care and private practice.

Career opportunities

Career opportunities as an occupational therapist exist in hospitals, community health, mental health services, schools, work rehabilitation and occupational health and safety in various industries, private practice, early intervention, aged care and a variety of health, education and disability services, including the provision of occupational therapy services under the National Disability Insurance Scheme.

Professional recognition

This course is accredited by Occupational Therapy Australia and the Occupational Therapy Council of Australia, and is approved by the World Federation of Occupational Therapists. Graduates of accredited occupational therapy programs are eligible for national registration. Graduates are also eligible for membership of Occupational Therapy Australia. Please note: In order to register to practise, the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency standards for English language must be met.

Entry pathways



Bachelor of Speech Pathology

ATAR 75

Duration 4 years full-time/8 years part-time

Starts February, June, October Location Gold Coast, Coffs Harbour

The Bachelor of Speech Pathology prepares you for entry into professional speech pathology practice. Speech pathologists assess and treat adults and children exhibiting acquired or congenital disorders of speech, fluency, voice, language and swallowing. The course includes arts and science-based units including phonetics and linguistics, audiology and neurology for speech pathology. Embedded throughout the course are principles of evidence-based practice, cultural competency and multimodal communication.

Majors

Indigenous Health (optional)

You will build theoretical and practical capability in areas including cultural protocols and Indigenous ways of knowing and being. This major includes embedded placement opportunities.

Professional placement

You complete approximately 1,000 hours of professional placements in diverse settings which might include the University's on-campus health clinic, public hospitals, private practice, community health, rehabilitation centres, aged care facilities, schools and rural health locations.

Career opportunities

Speech pathologists are employed in private practice, schools programs, in government agencies or in the health and wellbeing industry. Speech pathologists work independently and also with other health and education specialists in interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary teams.

Professional recognition

The Bachelor of Speech Pathology is accredited by Speech Pathology Australia, the national professional and accrediting body.

Entry pathways





Bachelor of Sport and Exercise Science

ATAR 60

Duration 3 years full-time/6 years part-time

Starts February, June, October

Location Gold Coast, Lismore, Coffs Harbour

The Bachelor of Sport and Exercise Science prepares you to work with people who want to improve their health, fitness and wellbeing, prevent chronic conditions, or improve sporting performance. The course is focused on anatomy, physiology, human movement, exercise physiology, exercise psychology, exercise prescription and sports conditioning and training. This course also provides an accelerated pathway towards postgraduate study to achieve professional accreditation as an accredited exercise physiologist or as a secondary school PDHPE teacher.

Majors

- Exercise Science
- Education.

Professional placement

You complete a 140-hour exercise science placement in the final year of the course. This may be within clinical settings, the health and fitness industry, community and professional sport, elite programs of state and national sport organisations, schools, academies of sport, and within the wider sport, recreation and leisure industries.

Career opportunities

As an exercise scientist, graduates can expect to gain employment in sports coaching, strength training and conditioning, sport development, performance testing, health promotion, and sports or recreation facility and program management.

Graduates may also choose to pursue further postgraduate study, receiving up to four units of credit towards the Master of Clinical Exercise Physiology, which enables accreditation as an exercise physiologist. Total duration of the combined Bachelor of Sport and Exercise Science and Master of Clinical Exercise Physiology is four years.

This degree is also a pathway to the Master of Teaching that can prepare students as PDHPE teachers in secondary settings.

Professional recognition

The Bachelor of Sport and Exercise Science is accredited by Exercise and Sport Science Australia (ESSA) at the Exercise Science level.
All graduates, regardless of the major completed, will be eligible for full membership as Exercise

Scientists with ESSA.

Please note: In order to apply to be an Accredited Exercise Scientist, ESSA's requirements for English

language must be met.

The course is also recognised by the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA) of America. Undergraduates are eligible for registration as an Exercise Professional with Fitness Australia (FA) after completing the first two years of study in the Bachelor of Sport and Exercise Science. Graduates are eligible for registration as a Level 1 Strength and Conditioning Coach with the Australian Strength and Conditioning Association (ASCA).

Graduates of the Bachelor of Sport and Exercise Science may undertake further postgraduate study to gain registration as an Accredited Exercise Physiologist (AEP).

Entry pathways

Diploma of Health

ATAR 45

Duration 1 year full-time/2 years part-time

Starts February, October (October start Gold Coast only)

Location Gold Coast, Coffs Harbour, online*

The Diploma of Health is a pathway program into a range of Southern Cross University Bachelor degrees, equipping you with foundational knowledge and skills across a range of health disciplines. You may tailor your course by choosing a specialisation from the following: sport and exercise science, occupational therapy, speech pathology, psychological science, biomedical science and osteopathic studies.

Career opportunities

Graduates of the Diploma of Health can seek professional work in a range of health professions including as health care assistants. It is also a pathway into a range of Bachelor degrees. Successful completion of the Diploma of Health guarantees entry and up to 8 units of credit (depending on the stream taken) towards a linked Southern Cross degree in biomedical science, speech pathology, occupational therapy, sport and exercise science, osteopathic studies or psychological science.

*Please note that not all units are offered online in health sciences. If you are interested in studying online, some units must be completed on-campus as they are not available online and require mandatory attendance. Psychological Science is the only stream offered entirely online.

This course is offered through SCU College, where we understand that students have diverse experiences and ways of learning. The College supports your study success and connects you to your peers through additional workshops to develop academic and study skills.



Indigenous Knowledge





When rescuing turtles is your day job

Olivia (Olly) Pitt

Bachelor of Marine Science and Management and Bachelor of Science (Honours) graduate General Manager Australian Seabird Rescue

Olivia (Olly) Pitt is the general manager for Australian Seabird Rescue, the Ballina-based organisation responsible for rescuing and rehabilitating more than 80 turtles as well as dozens of pelicans and seabirds every year. Their injuries range from ingested fishing line, hooks and ocean plastic, gut infections and even attacks from other animals like goannas or dogs. For Olly it's a dream job. "You never know what's

going to come in – we might be monitoring pelicans, scrubbing down turtles, working with our fantastic volunteers – no two days are ever the same," she said.

"When I began my degree we started studying rocks and I thought, why are we studying rocks in a marine science degree? But understanding the natural world is critical to understanding how and where these animals are living."

The practical component of her degree proved invaluable. "Southern Cross University has a good reputation for being out in the field and every subject we did had fieldwork involved. That was excellent preparation for the kind of work we are doing now," said Olly. The Bachelor of Science is a flexible degree that allows you to incorporate a wide range of subjects with career-focused science specialisations.

You can focus on an area of professional practice by choosing a specialisation in Earth and Environmental Systems, Marine Systems, Forestry Systems or Regenerative Agriculture. These specialisations are identified on your graduating testamur. Alternatively, you can choose a major from Applied Chemistry, Biology, Mathematics, Environmental Solutions or a shared major from disciplines across the University.

You can effectively design your own science degree. In addition to the specialisation or major you choose, you will study core units that provide a strong foundation in science, including field and laboratory experimentation and analytical techniques, as well as socioecological systems, management and critical thinking. Core skills and knowledge are reinforced and expanded across the three-year program, finishing with capstone research projects in Impactful Science and Practice.

The Bachelor of Science is characterised by a high level of practical and field experience in all years, making the most of our easy access to a variety of subtropical terrestrial, coastal and marine ecosystems.

Specialisations

Specialisations are a group of units which develop specialist skills and knowledge. All specialisations provide capstone units that reinforce your chosen field via research and applied practice.

In the Bachelor of Science you can choose one of the following specialisations:

Earth and Environmental Systems

This specialisation develops your skills in and understanding of environmental science and management, to address how we interact with Earth systems in the Anthropocene. You will study units covering ecology, ecosystem regeneration, biogeochemistry, modelling and resource management (including water, catchments and waste/resources in the circular economy). You can choose a shared major as part of this specialisation or choose from a range of elective units, including ecological economics, wildlife conservation, and protected area management.

Career opportunities exist in public and private sectors, national park and protected area management, environmental protection, waste management, environmental impact assessment and monitoring, environmental education and interpretation, ecotourism, land/river/coast care programs; and in environmental science research.

Marine Systems

This specialisation builds on introductory earth systems knowledge with units at our National Marine Science Centre adjacent to the Solitary Islands Marine Park. These Marine units cover oceanography, marine ecology, fish and aquaculture, reefs, fisheries and marine parks management. You can choose a shared major as part of this specialisation or choose from a range of elective units including marine megafauna, ocean change biology, drone technology and special spatial analysis, and coastal fluvial hydrodynamics.

Career opportunities exist in marine park management, fisheries and aquaculture, reef restoration, marine monitoring, marine-based tourism, state or federal government, marine consulting, or marine science research and technical assistance.

Forestry Systems

This specialisation covers the vital role forests play in natural and managed systems. Building on core science principles, you will study native forest silviculture, fire ecology and management, planted trees and forests, wood science and utilisation, forest operations and technology. You can choose a shared major as part of this specialisation or choose from a range of elective units including modelling natural systems, plant and disease management, agriculture and forest value chains, and plant biology.

Changes in the industry continue to drive demand for degree-qualified foresters able to work in production, conservation and restoration forestry, in plantation establishment and management; native forest management, fire prevention and control; forest resource assessment; policy development; pest and disease management; agroforestry and farm forestry advisory services; forest growth

modelling and yield prediction; protected area management and forest science research.

Regenerative Agriculture

The specialisation investigates human ecology, soil processes, regenerative strategies and soil management, as well as the planning of rural landscapes, developing specialist knowledge and taking a holistic approach to food production and farm management. A key aspect of this practice specialisation is practical on-farm residential schools. You can also choose seven units from any other specialisation.

Career opportunities exist in public and private sectors as a regenerative agriculture specialist/consultant, farmer, resource manager, regenerative agronomist, sustainability advisor and planner, policy developer, biologist, ecologist, soil health scientist, or in scientific research.

Majors

If you do not choose a specialisation, you can choose one or two majors from the following:

- Applied Chemistry
- Biology
- Mathematics
- Environmental Solutions.

You can also choose a shared major as part of your studies. See page 12 for details.

Career Opportunities

Graduates are prepared to apply science in the context of broader systems to address complex intellectual, professional, practical and societal challenges in the Anthropocene.

Career opportunities include natural resource management in local council, state Commonwealth Government or not-for-profit organisations; consulting, as an industry adviser or practitioner; research technician; quality control/quality assurance officer; data analyst or science communicator.

Combined with further study in education, graduates may also be prepared for roles in high school science teaching.

Specialisations allow students to develop expertise in an area of practice including Marine, Forest, Earth and Environmental Science or Regenerative Agriculture. Career opportunities in these more specific areas are detailed above.

Professional placement

You can undertake an optional internship in a career-relevant organisation.

Professional recognition

Depending on the specialisation or major taken, graduates may be eligible for membership of professional organisations such as the Institute of Foresters of Australia.

Entry pathways

Graduates of the Diploma of Science are eligible for entry to this course with up to 8 units of credit.

Diploma of Science

The Diploma of Science will prepare you with a grounding in scientific knowledge and skills and a taste of the many opportunities that science provides. You will learn the language and nature of science and mathematics and be able to follow your interests in specific areas of science.

The course includes specialisations in the following disciplines: Earth and Environmental Systems, Forestry Systems, Marine Systems, Regenerative Agriculture or Engineering and a pathway to linked degrees in these areas should you wish to pursue further study.

The Diploma of Science is offered through SCU College, where we understand that learners have diverse experiences and ways of learning. The College connects you to your peers and offers additional workshops to develop your academic and study skills.

Career opportunities

The Diploma is a pathway to linked Bachelor degrees in science or engineering with up to 8 units of credit, depending on course and units taken.

Graduates of the Diploma of Science may also find work in para-professional roles, including positions as field assistants, laboratory assistants and environmental monitoring officers.





National Marine Science Centre

The National Marine Science Centre (NMSC) is part of Southern Cross University's Faculty of Science and Engineering.

Located in Charlesworth Bay, Coffs Harbour, the Centre sits on the edge of the beautiful Solitary Islands Marine Park.

The Solitary Islands have a unique range of tropical and temperate habitats such as corals and kelp forests – the perfect environment for marine research and education programs. In fact the National Marine Science Centre is one of the world's best-located facilities for studying coastal and marine habitats and their inhabitants.

The Centre has state-of-the-art teaching facilities, climate-controlled laboratories, aquaculture facilities including a commercial hatchery, a public aquarium and a world-class flowthrough sea water system.

Teaching and research at the NMSC equips a new generation of marine scientists with the knowledge and skills to address marine sustainability issues and develop our understanding of marine and coastal life.



The Bachelor of Community Welfare provides you with the theoretical and practical foundations for work in the human services sector. You will gain skills in case management, community development, counselling, social research, policy work, advocacy, traumainformed practice, and grief and loss counselling.

Particular emphasis is placed on social justice and human rights as the basis for community welfare practice. The course articulates with a range of VET awards and is a pathway to the Master of Social Work (Professional Qualifying) which fulfils the academic pre-requisites for qualification as a social worker.

Core units focus on counselling, case management, mental health, human services, research, youth work, disability and community development.

Professional placement

You complete 400 hours of supervised on-the-job training in a range of organisations to prepare for a career in social welfare. Please note students must obtain a National Police Check and a Working with Children Check.

Career opportunities

Graduates of this course will have opportunities to use their transferable skills in human services careers that might include government and non-government positions in fields such as child protection, disability services, housing services, youth work, aged care, alcohol and drug rehabilitation, community engagement, mental health services, and domestic violence services.

The course also provides a pathway to the Southern Cross Master of Social Work (Professional Qualifying) to qualify as a social worker.

Professional recognition

The course is accredited by the Australian Community Workers Association (ACWA). Graduates are eligible to join ACWA.

The Bachelor of Social Work is an entry-level, professionally-accredited qualification to practise as a social worker. Particular emphasis is placed on social justice and human rights as the basis for social work practice.

Core units focus on counselling, case management, mental health, human services, research, child protection, disability and community development, combined with the choice of electives or an embedded Honours program if you are interested in pursuing research in this field.

This course prepares graduates for employment as a social worker in a range of health and community services settings with the ability to work with people of all backgrounds and needs.

Professional placement

You complete 1,000 hours of supervised placement in a human service organisation as part of your course. Please note you must obtain a National Police Check and a Working with Children Check.

Career opportunities

Graduates of this course will be qualified to work as social workers in government and non-government positions in fields such as child protection, disability services, housing services, health care, youth work, aged care, alcohol and drug rehabilitation, community engagement, mental health services, and domestic violence services.

Professional recognition

The course is accredited by the Australian Association of Social Workers (AASW).



Library services

Libraries are located at all campuses and provide students with print and online resources, computers, printing and photocopying facilities, and spaces for both group work and individual study.

The Library's online resources include electronic books and journals that can be accessed anywhere, anytime on your desktop, laptop or mobile device. You can borrow print resources from all Southern Cross University libraries. Items not held at your home campus can be requested through the catalogue and will be delivered free of charge, either to the campus of your choice or to your home address if you study online.

Librarians are available in person, over the phone, via online chat or email to help you. The Library website offers a range of useful online guides and other information that will help you to find the resources you need

Students studying online can benefit from having print books mailed out to them, with free return postage included. They can also request copies of journal articles or book chapters from print sources in the library to be scanned and delivered electronically.

Other universities in Australia and New Zealand extend borrower status to our students. You'll need to provide your student photo ID card and proof of current enrolment to the University library from which you wish to borrow. Charges may apply at some libraries.


